



ABOUT POINT

POINT was established as NGO by a group of Diaspora humanitarian experts. As an NGO, the co-founders of POINT realized the crucial gaps between providing aids and the need for building the resilience of communities.

We believe at POINT that the best solutions to support the people in crisis should be by a quick transformation from rapid response to resilience method, as this approach within humanitarian operations is crucial to the first efforts of a community to recover, rise again, and start to use their capacity, starting from education and livelihood at the first stages, ending by early recovery and rehabilitation at later stages.

POINT has figured out the gaps that prevent the civil societies to play a greater role in improving the response to the crises by building their capacity internally using the available resources in the affected communities. PROMOTING SOCIAL INNOVATION


POINT is evolving to become more innovative and efficient and to respond effectively to the new and emerging needs of the affected civilians.

We believe that partnerships with individuals, other organizations and communities promote creative and fruitful initiatives.

06 Respect:

We believe people affected by disasters can and should be empowered to contribute to relief, rehabilitation and development efforts.

07 Accountability:

we comply with all international humanitarian and professional standards with all parties according to Core Humanitarian Standards CHS, the international standards for quality and accountability for humanitarian work.

OUR WORK DOMAINS

CCCM Camp Coordination and Camp Management

We design our programs to support the formal and informal camps in targeted countries to save the beneficiaries' rights, offering protection for them and enable the accountability strategies in the camps. Furthermore, we share experience with cluster/sector or working groups and any other formal approaches to participate effectively in decision making for establishing new sites/- camps by mapping and verification processes to support the local actors to establish sites that matching the CCCM Toolkit and SPHERE standards. Moreover, community participation is one of the targeted objectives in our strategy to enhance their participation and achieve their ownership of projects, we do that through multi interventions specifically capacity development, cash grants to implement projects by camp committees to the camp residents. We care to design our interventions in the camps in collaboration with camp committees and involve them in implementation and consider their recommendations for activities such as rehabilitation of roads, maintenance of the schools or WASH facilities...etc.

Early Recovery and Economic Empowerment

The domain programs designed to mitigate the causes of poverty which are complex and can include political, social, economic, and environmental factors that often create barriers for poor households. Addressing these barriers to economic empowerment within a community not only strengthens their ability to succeed in the short-term but also helps them become more resilient in the face of unexpected disasters. Our programs have tailored tools and strategies to target camps, urban areas, and rural areas. We are working closely with the communities by using a community-based approach to support their resources and provide them new resources to mitigate poverty, sustain the market chains, and focus on innovations solutions. Engineering interventions for the targeted areas are one of our programs approaches to create sustainable solutions for the beneficiaries to access the market, build up the market capacity, and to support the economy of areas in engineering to make income-generating projects. engineering interventions also can provide protection for beneficiaries by rehabilitating solutions for their houses, roads, or WASH facilities to mitigate the risks for them and do no harm. With the mainstreaming for gender issues, we include women empowerment components in our programs to support the women for a greater role in empowering targeted areas

CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT FOR LOCAL ACTORS

As POINT one of the pioneers in the Capacity Development in the region, this wide domain is aiming to empower and strengthen workers and organizations in the humanitarian field for better crisis response, more cost-efficient, and higher qualitative project delivery. POINT seek to include the training, coaching, long term follow up, for those who participate in its programs. for that, we are always developing our experience in coordination with high institutions around the world.

Civilians Education and Protection

The programs of this domain aim to strengthen the communities in education, knowledge, and protection. our targets are to mainstream the Humanitarian protection & education standards. wherefore, We focus on increasing the quality and access to education for children. Also to enhance the youth to higher education to support them in the coping strategy. Furthermore, it increases the capacity of communities and organizations related to protection standards. The main approach of these programs is community-based mainstreaming and capacity development. All activities pursue to ensuring full respect for the rights of the individual in accordance with the letter and spirit of the relevant bodies of law (i.e. human rights law, international humanitarian law, and refugee laws.



Project Brief

This project targets 510 HH of highly vulnerable returnees, IDP's and host community members living in and around Hawija centre/Kirkuk with Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA).The most vulnerable individuals will be selected using the CWG's SEVAT tool, taking into consideration, the negative impact of COVID-19 outbreak and its subsequent containment measures, in disruption financial services with immediate and long-term economic consequences. 510 conflict-affected households (306 female headed households, and 204 male) will directly receive a one-off payment of MPCA for the amount of USD 800\$ to meet critical basic needs and reduce negative coping strategies in conflict-affected out-of-camp communities in Kirkuk, filling gaps in service provision such as the absence of NGOs like Tearfund who was covering this needs in previous times . This will support households by giving them the choice in how to spend the MPCA and respecting their dignity. The one-off payment will be distributed through the international Hawala agency to avoid complications of liquidity. Such assistance will be delivered in conflict-affected communities in Kirkuk in areas where markets are functioning, accessible, and safe delivery of cash will be possible . Without access to hard currency due to the liquidity crisis, a decline in purchasing power due to inflation, and low or no income available to meet their basic needs, vulnerable households suffer the most from the effects of the protracted crisis, increasing their reliance on negative coping mechanisms and exposure to protection threats. A rapid needs assessment (RNA) in May 2020 has identified locations for the intervention (Shubat, Salam, and Nasr neighborhoods), as well as having identified areas where other actors will no longer be implementing , meaning that the consortium partners will be able to fill this much needed gap, and that's why we have coordinated well with Kirkuk livelihoods Sub cluster, community members, the CWG,CCI members, Hawala agencies and others to understand the need and the possibilities of covering the gaps. A further RNA conducted by IRC in Kirkuk in May 2020, highlighted the needs in their communities for humanitarian assistance, especially cash, for vulnerable families who have been impacted by their inability to access sufficient food and/or cash. The targeted households will be assessed using the Socio-Economic Vulnerability Assessment Tool (SEVAT) as provided by the Cash Working Group. This intervention is building towards the HRP 2020 SO2 Critical problems related to living standards. POINT will use a community-based approach by establishing a community committee to allow the communities to feed into the design and implementation of the project. They will steer the delivery of the project as well as establish community buy-in for the project.


